Filled with optimism make yourself sociable, upright, judicious, and above all things be sober and collected in your habits, cautious in your actions and sparing in your speech;

Study the past of your own, and of the country to which you owe your allegiance, learn how to master with purity the two most essential languages — English and Spanish.

Always be honorable and high-minded, learn how to be self-reliant upon your own qualifications and resources;

Believe in God, love Humanity and rely upon the framework of human progress, slow and sound, unequivocal and firm;

In war serve your country, in peace your convictions; discern, investigate, meditate and think, study, at all times be honest and generous.

Let your firmest purpose be that of helping to see that each new generation of your own shall be of a youth more efficient and capable, and in this, let your own children be included.

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## THE GLORY OF AMERICAN CITIZENSHIP

*Resumé of an address delivered on  
Armistice Day at Rio Grande City,  
Texas, by Hon. Std. L. Hard'n, Supt.  
of Public Schools of Mission, Texas*

To those of the Latin race that have become citizens of this Republic by birth or by naturalization, I call your attention today to the Glory of Citizenship in the American Republic. We have a constitutional form of government designed to bring about the greatest peace and happiness of our people. In America you have the right to worship God according to the dictates of your own conscience and the Government cannot interfere with your church program and neither can it tax you for the operation and maintenance of any church. You have complete freedom of the press subject only to the libel laws which protect innocent people. You have the right to assemble and petition those in authority for anything that you desire. No soldiers can be quartered in your private homes. Your home is your castle and the government cannot search your home through its agents without a warrant secured in the proper way and issued upon probable cause. You cannot be compelled to give testimony against yourself and placed twice in jeopardy for the same offense. Your farms, your homes, your real and personal property cannot be taken from you without due process of law. No excessive bond can be imposed upon you and no cruel or unusual punishments can ever be inflicted upon you. You have a right to be confronted with all witnesses who give testimony against you. These are but a few of the great privileges and alienable rights that citizenship in America bestows upon you.

The flag of this Republic does not recognize race or color, but guarantees to all the same rights and the same liberties.

When one becomes a citizen of the United States he renounces his allegiance to his former country and swears allegiance to this Republic. He ceases to be identified with his former country and becomes identified with this country. Latin-American Citizens of the United States should cease to observe the holidays of Mexico and join heartily in observing the holidays of the United States. The French, German, English and other races cease to observe the holidays of their former countries when they become citizens of America and Latin-Americans should do likewise. The more quickly you adopt American customs and American traditions the better citizens you will become in the United States.

What is the present status of the Latin-American Citizen in the United States? He is disowned in Mexico for he is not a citizen of that Republic, and he has been discriminated against in this country. Even his greatest competitor for work and labor is the alien within our gates. In some sections the Latin-American Citizen is almost a man without a country—disowned in Mexico and not recognized here. What is the remedy? The remedy is education of your children.

The prejudice that exists today in is due largely to the history of Texas that has been taught in our

is due largely to the history of Texas that has been taught in our Public Schools for many years. Texas history as it has been taught for several generations is more of a fable than a history. It pictures the Mexican as a robber, a murderer and a thief. Before we can destroy the prejudice against the Latin-American in Texas we must have a Texas History for our Public Schools that is based on facts. Our Texas History as taught in the schools of this state makes little mention of General Mexico who fought so nobly for the Texas cause; makes little reference to Lorenzo de Zavala who wrote undying History of Texas; and makes no mention of Juan Seguin that noble hero who identified the bodies of Crockett, Travis and others and gave them a Christian burial in San Antonio. The flag that flew from the Alamo was not the Flag of Texas, as we have been taught, but the Flag of the Constitution of 1824 of the Mexican Republic, and Travis was defending that flag against the Dictatorship of Santa Anna. The expedition of Captain Cameron was similar to the expeditions of Pancho Villa into this Country a few years ago. It was an expedition wholly without the sanction of government, while Texas history paints them as heroes, and weaves from the story a great fairy tale that is unfair to the Latin race.

After generations of teaching Texas history based on fables it is only natural that a great prejudice would exist towards the Latin-American, and I know of no greater service that the LULAC organization could render both Anglo-Saxon and Latin-American races in this State, than to secure for the schools of Texas, a Texas history based on facts, a text that is fair and one that tells the whole truth. I pledge my best efforts and my influence to hasten the day in this State when such a text book will be introduced into our schools.

Your children need the same equipment, the same expert teaching and the same opportunities that are afforded any other American citizen, and when you have given these advantages they make just as great progress and show just as much development as the children of any

other race. After almost twenty years of teaching the children of many races, I speak from experience and therefore from authority on this subject. Give the Latin-American child an education and he will make a citizen that will reflect credit to his race and honor upon this country.

Our Congratulations to the Latin American people of Eagle Pass. During the last county elections in that city, Mr. Griff Jones, a Latin American, and brother of our beloved brother-member Paul C. Jones, was elected County Commissioner of Maverick County.

Mr. Griff Jones has the honor of being one of the few members of our race to be elected to public office in a county in Texas. He is the son of Mr. Paul C. Jones Sr. and Mrs. Ines M. de Jones, both deceased. His Brother Paul is Deputy Tax Assessor of Bexar County.

Mr. Jones ran on the Independent Voters Association ticket, and the other candidates on the same ticket were defeated, but himself. As he is Vice President of the Eagle Pass Council of LULAC rumors has it that LULAC is responsible for his election, as all the Eagle Pass Lulackers supported him individual-ly. ## THE FLYING SQUADRON AT POTEET

A new council was formed at Poteet, Texas, on the 20th of November. Several members of the San Antonio council, forming the already famous FLYING SQUADRON, made the trip to the Strawberry center of Texas.

After partaking of a good Chicken Dinner, the San Antonio Boys went to the High School, where in the Auditorium of the School, at 3 o'clock the meeting took place.

Before a good-sized audience, Mr. Ernesto Rodriguez, a member of the S. A. council, but now a resident of Poteet, introduced Mr. John C. Solis, President of the S. A. Council and Special Organizer, who in turn introduced the delegation from San Antonio. Mr. Solis explained the Purposes of the Meeting and the Aims and Purposes of the League.

Brothers Jacobo I. Rodriguez, Ernillo R. Lozano and Thomas Garza delivered short but very appropriate addresses on LULAC and they all stressed the importance of Poteet forming a link of the long chain of LULAC COUNCILS.

The council was organized the following officials elected: Alfredo Fernández, President; Nemesio García, Vice President; Pedro Salas, Secretary and A. B. Treviño, Treasurer. About 20 active members were initiated and about the same number of honorary members promised to cooperate with the council. Most of the honorary members are Mexican citizens who are well disposed to LULAC WORK.

It is noteworthy that in Poteet there is no segregation in the schools. They have a splendid high school and good instruction. Mr. Solis speaking in the name of the S. A. Council and LULAC in general, thanked Prof. S. V. Burke for his splendid cooperation, having granted the use of the High School Auditorium for the meeting, for his known interest in the students regardless of race and for his expression of sympathy for our people and the LULAC principles.

Lone Wolf of the Big Bend country, long ago nicknamed "Old Killer", is dead, and ranchmen roundabout for a hundred miles or so are rejoicing. For years the beast—became almost legendary—had raided flocks and

herds killing the fattest sheep, goats and calves, apparently for the joy of the slaughter. Stockmen estimated its prey at a thousand animals a year. The sly wolf avoided all kinds of traps and escaped many organized hunting parties. Old Killer's end came about unexpectedly: A Mexican youth named Venesuella, astride his pony, jumped the beast on the Lloyd Mitchell ranch near Marfa, emptied his sixshooter futilely, chased the wolf into a canyon, hemmed it up, seized it by the hind legs and dashed it to death against the rock wall.

Venesuella cannot understand why he is now a hero to the ranchmen: he merely had killed another wolf. Herodotus tells the story of the Spartan youth who killed a wolf with his bare hands, along with that of the lad who hid a fox in his bosom. Then there was the Chimera which ravaged Lycia until Bellerophon, astride Pegasus, slaughtered the fiery monster. Meleager slew the wild boar of Calydon, but only after Atalanta's arrow had wounded the beast. The Big Bend is still pastoral: it is not far removed from the Heroic Age.

The aim is not to think of selling, for it is the biggest thing in life, but rather not to think that it is a distinct field of endeavor. When we get to understand the real meaning of selling and that it belongs to every human being in his activity than we will recognize it as the biggest word in our dictionaries and the biggest thing in our life.

## A BLIND ARTIST'S SUCCESS

A few days ago we had we had occasion to listen to the concerts of a famous violinist from Mexico City.

This great artist is blind and is a composer and violinist of note. Worthy of mention are the fact that his own musical education was obtained in the school of which he later became head, he being head of the school for blind in Mexico City. The institution founded in 1870 by Ignacio Figueroa, now has 180 boys and 70 girls.

Prof. Cervantes, who in 1928 was invited by the State of California to inspect the institutions for the blind and suggests methods of modernizing them, says he does not regard blindness as a handicap. "To me it has been one of my great fortunes to be blind. I do not ask for pity, but on the contrary I expect congratulations that I have not let a little thing like the loss of my sight stand in the way of whatever success I may have gained."

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## AIMS AND PURPOSES

About sixty-two years after the birth of Christ the apostle Paul saved himself from unjust punishment by asking the official, "Is it lawful for you to scourge a man that is a Roman citizen?" For hundreds of years the proudest boast that a man could make was CIVIS ROMANUS SUM (I am a Roman citizen), and the power of the mighty Roman Empire was exerted to protect that man in any part of the known world. In the same way the nations of the world to-day protect their citizens wherever they go. Bearing this in mind it is imperative that we exert all in our power to develop among the members of our race the best, purest, and most perfect type of a true and loyal citizen of the United States of America as set out in our "Aims and Purposes", so that we may rightfully enjoy the rights to which we are entitled.

Do not we lose sight of the possibility that the change would have taken place without feeling the necessity of developing true and loyal citizens of our country? If

we expect to meet angels upon our future road, it will be much to our credit, meanwhile, to take in our own regeneration, not leaving all to be done by angelic agency.

As the flute is heard further than the cart, see how surely a beautiful form strikes the fancy of men, and is copied and reproduced without end. How many copies are there of the Belvedere Apolo, the Venus, the Warwick Vase, the Parthenon, and the Temple of Vesta? If we should strive to teach the members of our race the American's Creed, we would be going one step further in developing among the members the best, purest and most perfect types of true and loyal citizens. The Creed reads like this: I BELIEVE IN THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA AS A GOVERNMENT OF THE PEOPLE, BY THE PEOPLE, FOR THE PEOPLE; WHOSE JUST POWERS ARE DERIVED FROM THE CONSENT OF THE GOVERNED; A DEMOCRACY IN A REPUBLIC; A SOVEREIGN NATION OF MANY STATES; A PERFECT UNION; ONE AND INSEPARABLE; ESTABLISHED UPON THOSE PRINCIPLES OF FREEDOM EQUALITY, JUSTICE AND HUMANITY FOR WHICH AMERICAN PATRIOTS SACRIFICED THEIR LIVES AND FORTUNES.

## NUEVO CONCILIO EN GOLIAD

A petición del Sr. Anastasio Carbajal, vecino de la histórica ciudad de Goliad, una delegación del concilio de San Antonio y varios oficiales generales fueron allí, el Domingo 30 de octubre y organizaron un concilio. Los hermanos que hicieron el viaje fueron el Lic. M. C. González, J. C. Solís, Lic. Adolfo A. Garza, Mauro M. Machado, F. O. Dominguez, José Castañón, Evaristo Abrego, Jacobo Rodríguez, Alberto Salas, José A. Carrillo, Rosendo de la Garza y José A. Quintero. También los acompañó, como representantes de "La Prensa", el Ing. Manuel R. Vidal, miembro de la redacción de ese importante diario.

Reunidos los ciudadanos Americanos de origen Mexicano de Goliad en un salón del barrio latino, el Sr. Juan C. Solís abrió la sesión con la Oración oficial de costumbre. Habló en seguida el Sr. Anastasio Carbajal, exponiendo las razones que lo indujeron a solicitar la ayuda de la LULAC. Indicó las muchas dificultades con que ha tropezado ante las autoridades escolares para que su hijo reciba enseñanza en la escuela que le corresponde. Indicó que la escuela destinada a los latinos estaba en pésimas condiciones, carece de servicios sanitarios, es un pequeño salón de 20x30 pies y están aglomerados allí como 60 niños. Argumentó acerca de la enorme diferencia de las escuelas para los anglo-sajones y los niños de color, cuyas escuelas están dotadas de todo lo necesario y de lo mejor y los edificios son grandes, modernos, sanitarios y llenan todas las exigencias necesarias.

El Sr. Solís dio a conocer el programa de LULAC, especialmente el gran interés que tiene la organización en la educación de la niñez latino-Americana y exhortó a los padres de familia a que desplegaran todo su esfuerzo para lograr no solamente el bienestar de sus hijos, sino de las futuras generaciones.

El Lic. Adolfo A. Garza, habló sobre la existente condición del elemento Latino-Americano y dijo que deberamos unir nuestros esfuerzos

para luchar por nuestro propio bienestar. En algunas partes del país son tan pésimas las condiciones de los nuestros que no los reconocen como ciudadanos del país no obstante haber nacido aquí.

La situación en Goliad es igual a la de Del Río y otras comarcas, con excepción de que es peor en Goliad. En su concepto el caso de Goliad requiere una nueva acusación.

El Sr. Mauro M. Machado habló sobre los antepasados de los residentes latinos de Goliad, quienes figuraron notablemente en la historia de Texas, y en su lucha por su independencia. Goliad dio muchos héroes latinos a Texas, fue cuna del gran héroe Mexicano, General Ignacio Zaragoza, quien derrotó a las tropas francesas el 5 de Mayo de 1862 en Puebla.

El Sr. Teodoro Góngora, quien habló en seguida, refiriéndose a la negativa de uno de los directores de la instrucción pública, en admitir a uno de los nuestros a una escuela de Goliad, dijo que no es educada la persona que niega la educación a los niños. Expresó que LULAC necesita hombres que sepan defender sus derechos, hombres conscientes. Advirtió que debe pedirse con toda justicia nuestros derechos. Preguntó ¿Qué quieren? Renovarse o morir como esclavos?

El Lic. M. C. González, habló extensamente sobre los derechos que el Tratado de Guadalupe Hidalgo y las leyes dan a los Latino-Americanos, pero que desafortunadamente son ignorados. Hizo observar que en los Estados Unidos goza de más derechos el mexicano que el méxico-texano y para comprobar sus aserciones citó varios casos.

Dijo que era necesario convertir a Goliad en un lugar donde todos sus habitantes gocen de iguales derechos. A la vez mencionó que en Ozona, Texas, durante 40 años no tuvieron derecho a votar los Méjico-Americanos, defecto que la LULAC subsanó.

Terminó diciendo que en Goliad

A. C. Marfa, Texas.— Me pregunta usted en su carta que si una persona que haya sido recluida en una penitenciaría federal, y que no ha sido aun perdonada, tiene derecho a votar, y si eligible a ese derecho de que modo puede recobrarlo. En contestación le diré que un prisionero no pierde nunca su derecho de ciudadanía, pero el estado de Texas le niega el derecho de votar a una persona que haya sido sentenciada por haber cometido alguna felonía. Usted puede votar en las elecciones federales, pero no puede votar en las elecciones del estado. Lo que necesita usted es obtener un perdón y como no fue usted prisionero del estado sino federal o sea del gobierno de los Estados Unidos es necesario que usted obtenga un perdón del presidente de los Estados Unidos.

C. M. Dallas.— Me refiero a la propiedad que vendió al señor que menciona, y a quien extendió una escritura y título de propiedad, junto con una nota "Vendor's Lien", en 1925, la nota vencióse tres años después de la fecha otorgada en 1925. La mitad de la cantidad de la nota se pagó y el resto aún no se paga. Me parece que la ley según los "Statutes of Limitation" rezan contra de usted, pues habiéndose pasado cuatro años ya no tiene derecho a recobrar nada.

J. O. Laredo, Texas.— Su pregunta concierne a que si una persona deportada de los Estados Unidos por practicar la prostitución o alguna otra razón, puede volver al país puedo contestársela en esta forma. Cualquier persona que haya sido deportada de este país por cualquier mo-

tivo, puede hacer su aplicación nuevamente para su admisión al país, después de un año desde la fecha en que se efectuó la deportación. Si el Secretario del Trabajo lo cree conveniente puede volver al país con los mismos derechos y privilegios de que gozaba antes. Muchas personas y aun muchos abogados no etsán muy familiarizados con ésta ley, pero esto se debe a que hace poco que fue adoptada por el congreso de los Estados Unidos.
