The Orange County California School Case
(By Vice President General J. Gonzales)

A brief summary of facts as found by the District Court, Judge McCormick presiding are as follows: That Appellants (School Board) for several years past, and do at present, in furtherance and execution of "a common plan, design and purpose," by regulation, custom and usage, have required and now require that all children of Mexican descent be excluded, and appellants have thus excluded them from attending and using certain public schools within their respective districts which are maintained by appellants for, and are attended and used only by "white" or "anglo-saxon" children, and have required and now require that children of Mexican descent be segregated in and use certain public schools reserved exclusively for and attended solely by children of Mexican descent. Appellees, (School Children of Mexican descent) are citizens of the United States and all are of Mexican or Latin descent or extraction and all reside within the school districts included in the complaint. Each of the appellees has been and now is being segregated and compelled and required to attend a separate school reserved exclusively for children of Mexican descent or extraction, SOLELY FOR THE REASON that these appellees are of Mexican descent or extraction.

In the words of Attorney David C. Marcus, found in his conclusion to his reply brief which is filed in this case—"Of what avail is our theory of democracy if the principles of equal rights, of protection and equal obligations are not practiced? Of what avail is our good-neighbor policy if the good neighbor does not permit of honest neighborliness? Of what use are the four freedoms if freedom is not allowed? Of what avail

are the thousands upon thousands of lives of Mexican-Americans who sacrificed their all for their country in this great "War of Freedom" if freedom of education is denied them? Of what avail is our "education" if the system that propounds it denies the equality of all?"

Several issues back, Lulac carried a very interesting and illuminating article written by our capable Editor, Bro. George Garza. This article set forth factually and quite accurately the conditions existing in the educational institutions in the State of Texas. What George said there is no less applicable to three-fourths of the states in these United States. Texas is only one of many states afflicted with these shameful conditions and gross inadequacies as our editor complained of.

I am thinking of some of these other states and I begin to feel the magnitude of the task that lies before all of us who hold hopes for a day when all persons regardless of former ancestry, color or creed shall have the right to equal educational and economic opportunities and the equal protection of our laws. When all persons may meet on common ground as educated and intelligent human beings, forgetting those stupid and utterly false prejudices, mothered and nurtured by ignorance and handed down from the dark ages to poison the minds of gullible and moronic individuals who presume to be sane and who willingly accept and practice them for the sole purpose of furthering their own selfish ends.

Discrimination in our schools, etc, etc., many of us complain, is due to a lack of organization and a lack of funds with which to bring about costly litigation, etc., etc., thus we resignedly say we are hampered in our efforts to correct a deplorable situation. What a pity. (May I add—a lack of genuine interest coupled with half-hearted action on the part of too many persons). We have at the present time a very fine organization and as far as I know none of our members are on relief. If discrimination against our children by school officials continues we shall have no one to blame but ourselves. NO, Brothers and Sisters, we can no longer excuse ourselves.

I am firmly convinced that the renaissance of educational opportunity for the Latin-American child is at hand, unless we of the League of United Latin American Citizens permit the greatest opportunity which has ever come to us to slip through our fingers. I have reference to the Orange County, California, School Case which will be heard on appeal by the District Court of

Appeals on the 9th day of December, 1946 at San Francisco. I am confident that it is not necessary for me to plead or even to urge members of our organization, regardless of where they may be to support and join in the fight against those who would deprive our children of an education and who so ill-treat and humiliate them without provocation other than that they happen to have been born with a Latinized name and whose parents trace their ancestry to Mexico.

Since March 2, 1945 when this action was filed in the U. S. Dist. Court for the Southern Dist. of California and up to the present time there has been expended by council for plaintiff's, (Us—Appellees in present appeal) a total of approximately \$800.00, this sum represents costs exclusive of services of Counsel. This sum has been paid by contributions from various persons and groups and has been gathered almost entirely through the efforts of Brother Lulacs, members of Council 147 of Santa Ana, California.

The defendant School Board has already served notice that if a judgment favorable to

plaintiffs is rendered they will definitely appeal and we in turn are equally determined to appeal if the decision goes against us. It is evident therefore that in any event this case will inevitably reach the Supreme Court of the United States. The tremendous importance of a favorable decision rendered in our behalf by the highest court in the land cannot be overly emphasized and it obviates the necessity of explaining why every member of Lulac is duty bound to support this cause to the limit of their ability. The responsibility of EVERY man and woman in our organization becomes clear and none of us should suffer the burden to be placed upon the California councils alone, even though they would willingly shoulder it but of necessity would be forced to ask other groups for help.

Fellow Lulacs, even though a comparatively new addition to our beloved organization I feel that I can say that never in the history of Lulac has the call to arms been more urgent or for a more worthy cause and I should like to feel that when this fight is over each of us shall have

Regional Governor Joe Garza Attends Farm Labor Conference



In answer to an invitation from Dr. Ide P. Trotter, Director of the Extension Service of A. & M. College, Regional Governor Joe Garza of Corpus Christi, accompanied by President General Arnulfo Zamora of Laredo, and District Governor James Saenz of Corpus Christi, journeyed to College Station on Dec. 9 for the purpose of attending a one day Conference on Migratory Labor problems.

This is the third such conference held and the third time that Lulac has been invited to attend. The conference was also attended by members of the Mexican Consulate, the Good Neighbor Commission, the State Department of Education, The State Board of Health, the Vocational Rehabilitation Training for Veterans, Farmers, Crew Leaders, and plain farm hands.

The meeting was presided by Director Dr. Trotter and his able assistants, Cesar Hohn, and D. A. Adam. Summing up the results of the Migratory Farm Labor Program, Dr. Trotter said, "We can sum up our work with six important points; First and most important, the benefits received by the laborers; second, the benefits received by the farmer; third, the benefits received by the Agriculture Industry; fourth, the general benefits to the States of Texas; fifth, the general benefits to the U. S. A., and sixth, the International Goodwill accomplished.

Again Lulac was given the number one place on the program and Regional Governor Joe Garza reported on the manner in which our organization has helped the program. Besides personal contacts by members of Lulac, several Lulackers were selected to record radio programs which were used to advise the labor of the program. He also reported on the part taken by Lulac during

the year to bring about the education of the Migrant's children.

During the afternoon session Brother Garza was invited to participate on a radio program over Texas Quality Network, together with members of the Good Neighbor Commission and officials of the Farm Program.

Other Lulackers participating in the conference besides Brother Garza and the President General were James Saenz of Corpus Christi and Joe Castañuela of San Antonio Council No. 2. Joe Castañuela, who is considered one of the best authorities on Migratory Farm Labor in the country told the Conference that this type of work was better accomplished by honesty of purpose and the acquisition of the laborer's confidence.

Council No. One's "Pay Your Poll Tax" Committee was named recently and has started a very extensive campaign. They are L. G. Wilmot, Chairman, Willie Meza, Dr. Duran and E. E. Mirales.

SAN ANTONIO COUNCIL NO. 2

This council has kept up a series of important projects before the membership which has netted a full house at every meeting. Recently announced for action before the year ends we the following: Election of Officers, The Annual Tamalada, and the "Know your Youth Activities Organizations," campaign.

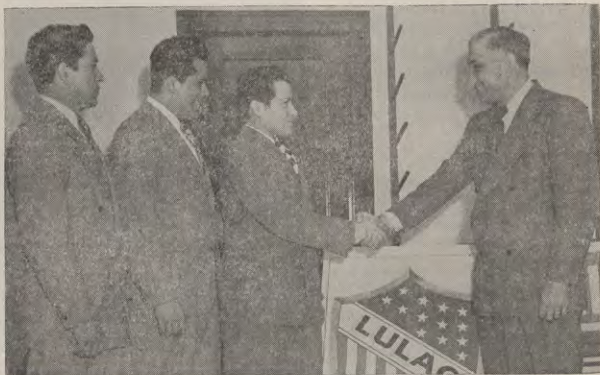

Aims and Purposes of the League of United Latin American Citizens

The aims and purposes of this Organization as amended at El Paso on June 24, 1944.

1. To develop within the members of our race the best, purest, and most perfect type of a true and loyal citizen of the United States of America.

2. To eradicate from our body political intents and tendencies to establish discrimination among our fellow-citizens on account of race, religion, or social position as being contrary to the true spirit of Democracy, our Constitution and Laws.

3. To use all the legal means at our command to the end that all citizens in our country may enjoy equal rights, the equal protection of the laws of the land and equal opportunities and privileges.

4. The acquisition of the English language, which is the official language of our country, being necessary for the enjoyment of our rights and privileges, we declare it to be official language of this Organization, and we pledge ourselves to learn, and speak, and teach same to our children.

5. To define with absolute and unmistakable clearness our unquestionable loyalty to the ideals, principles and citizenship of the United States of America.

6. We solemnly declare once and for all to maintain a sincere and respectful reverence for our racial origin of which we are proud.

7. By all lawful means at our command, we shall assist in the education and guidance of Latin-Americans and we shall protect and defend their lives and interests whenever necessary. We shall oppose any tendency to separate our children in the schools of this Country.

8. Each of us considers himself with equal responsibilities in our Organization, to which we voluntarily swear subordination and obedience.

9. We shall create a fund for mutual protection, for the defense of those of us who may be unjustly prosecuted and for the education and culture of our people.

10. This organization is not a political club, but as citizens we shall participate in all local, State and National political contests. However, in doing so, we shall ever bear in mind the general welfare of our people, and we shall disregard and abjure once and for all any personal obligation which is not in harmony with these principles.

11. With our vote and influence we shall endeavor to place in public office men who show by their deeds, respect and consideration for our people.

12. We shall select as our leaders those among us who demonstrate, by their integrity and culture,

that they are capable of guiding and directing us properly.

13. We shall maintain publicity means for the diffusion of these principles and for the expansion and consolidation of this Organization.

14. We shall pay our poll tax and urge all our fellow-citizens to do likewise, in order that we may enjoy our rights fully.

15. We shall diffuse our ideals by means of the press, lectures and pamphlets.

16. We shall oppose any radical and violent demonstration which may tend to create conflicts and disturb the peace and tranquility of our Country.

17. We shall have mutual respect for our religious views and we shall never refer to them in our Institution.

18. We shall endeavor to secure equal representation for our people on juries and in the administration of Governmental affairs.

19. We shall denounce every act of peonage and mistreatment as well as the employment of our minor children of scholastic age.

20. We shall resist and attack energetically all machinations tending to prevent our social and political unification.

EDITOR'S NOTE:

This Amendment to the Constitution has not been submitted to the local Councils for approval or rejection, but will be submitted for their consideration in the near future.

Having read your code and program and believing in the betterment of our people, I hereby apply for membership in the League of United Latin American Citizens.
